Presidents Report • July 2005...

just returned from the White Mountain Extravaganza and it was a great outing! Some of us arrived on Thursday and some on Friday. The fishing was definitely a challenge. Thursday afternoon we decided to fish Lee Valley Reservoir since it was close to camp. It was Steve, Bill, Bob Willard, and myself. Combined, we caught 10 fish and they were all apaches. I was surprised at how well they fought. The ones I caught were in the 11-13" range but they felt like much bigger fish. They did a lot of head shaking (similar to browns). At sundown, there was a huge midge hatch and so many bugs on the water that I had a hard time picking out my fly. Even with the hatch, we had a hard time getting the fish to cooperate. On Friday, we got up early (about 4:00) and met Bob and his friend Troy at Sunrise Lake. Again, it wasn't fast and furious. I worked hard for the 2 fish I landed and then we were blown off the lake at about 8:00. We headed back to camp for breakfast and to come up with a plan for the rest of the day. We ended up at a lake that I have heard about but never fished called Carnero. It reminded me a little of Crescent because there are lots of bugs but also lots of weeds you have to kick or row through to get to open water. Marsha, Bill and I spent about 30 minutes watching a damsel come out of its casing and stretch out its wings. It literally transformed in front of us. With all of the bugs, we figured we were in for a good day of fishing. That turned out to not be the case. The fishing was tough and there were only a few fish caught but we heard from locals that there were lots of fish in there in the 18" range. There was a recent Game & Fish article that mentioned "good numbers of 1-3 pound rainbow trout" in that lake. It is a great lake to explore but only go if you don't mind the wind and kicking through a lot of weeds to reach open water. We left there exhausted from the wind and ended up on A-1. We picked that lake because we wanted a place that we knew the fishing would be fairly easy. A-1 is one of those places where you probably won't catch anything big but will definitely catch something. We fished a hatch until it was too dark to see our flies and then went back to intermediate sinking line. There were enough fish caught to make it worth the trip. On Saturday, we took a group to Drift Fence. It sits between Reservation and Lake X (Pacheta). As we had hoped, the fishing was too good to be true with everyone hooking up. The best patterns seemed to be damsel imitations. We caught fish on Bill's damsel, sunrise specials, olive colored semi seals, Denny Rickards' Stillwater Nymph, and a few on grasshoppers. We returned for the chili dinner and some nice conversation around the campfire. Sunday morning we woke up to WIND and decided to end it on a good note and go home. All in all it was a great outing!

There are many more DFC outings coming up that will be just as fun and exciting. July is Lee's Ferry, August is the Greer Outing, October is the San Juan, and we will be headed to Rocky Point in November. I hope you can join us!

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
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Carp and Bass

For the last few years, I've enjoyed an early morning bicycle ride along the pathway that runs beside the lakes in the neighborhood south of US60 and west of Dobson Road. (Dobson Ranch)

Although not done every morning, as often as possible for the exercise and to see the water. It's always nice to see the water.

At a good pace, the sound of the tires on the pavement is calming.

As you approach the lake, one starts to look for what's in the H2O.

Several months ago, I observed a large carp, (as long as your arm and as thick as a man's leg) feeding in the shallows.

I slowed up, circled back and leaned on a tree to watch the activity from an elevated perch.

The reason I stopped was the small bass hanging, suspended just a short distance from the carp's right shoulder.

The carp, perhaps pushing 30 inches, was creating a mini "dust storm" underwater searching for food.

The bass, maybe eight inches, was there to take advantage of any small creature escaping the carp. Upon clearing the underwater dust cloud, the bass would ambush any prey that escaped the carp's suction.

Scientists would say a "symbotic " relationship.

We might say interesting and fun to watch.

Most fishermen, (this term encompasses all who have a rod in their hands and give solid attempt to net fish) like to observe nature, outside what might dictate fishing conditions, like when an Osprey ciccles an area of a lake, looking to feed.

Of course, fishermen see a neat, winged creature, with excellent command of their environment, seeking the same thing they are.

"Gosh, I wish I could see what that Ospery is seeing!"

Maybe a little like carp and bass.

Not an exact parallel comparisum but we observe thinking the area the fish hawk is circling probably holds fish...

Once, from the lakeshore, we saw a garter snake catch and swallow a small minnow. The thing that was interesting is that the snake had to maneuver the small fish so it could be swallowed head first

Circle Hooks

There has been a lot of recent interest in the circle hook. Circle hooks are not new. They have been around for centuries as evidenced by ancient artifacts of bones and other primitive



materials shaped into a circle hook. Commercial fishermen have used them for decades due to their ability to efficiently catch fish.

The principle behind the hook is

simple. The fish swallows the baited hook and starts to swim away. The line tightens slowly and pulls the hook out of the stomach. Since the fish is swimming away, the angle of the line is against the jaw. Due to the recurve of the hook point, as the hook comes forward, it does not catch on anything until it nears the mouth where it rotates and pierces the jaw hinge or cheek.

Once the fish is hooked, it cannot escape. The circle hook is particularly effective for trotlines where there is no fisherman to set the hook. It is not particularly suited for lures and fly-fishing where there is a "strike".

There are mixed reviews among sport fishermen. Those that favor the circle hook have learned to change their technique of fishing. Success depends on NOT setting the hook like we do with the traditional "J" hook. You must fish with a slack line allowing the fish to swim away with the bait.

Conservationists are urging the use of circle hooks for bait fishing because the design usually results in a hook through the jaws or lips. This increases the fish's chance of survival after release.

The American Fisheries Society has published a scientific study comparing hook-ups and mortality. The study concluded circle hook were as effective in hook-ups as the "J" hooks. In addition, the use of circle hooks resulted in lower rates of deep hooking, foul hooking, and bleeding providing better survival for catch and release. In summary, circle hooks may have little use for us fly fishermen but it certainly would benefit to the trout if the bait fishermen would use circle hooks with their corn and cheese balls.



EDITOR'S NOTES: If my memory serves me correctly I remember during the early part of the Clouser presentation Bob discussed briefly the "circle hook."





