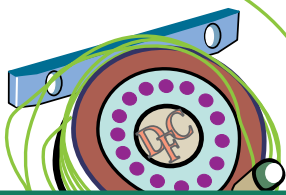
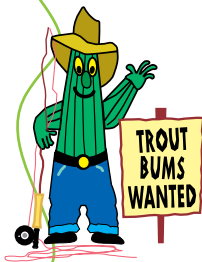

Fly Fishing Tips For Beginners

Strong Trout...

If you've ever wondered how strong a fish really is, consider that water is 780 times as dense as air, and thus moving through it requires much more energy. If you need proof, try hammering a nail below the water's surface. Just swinging the hammer becomes a task. But with a few flicks of its tail and undulations of its body, a fish swims through water at impressive speeds.

Flyfishing Deep...

If you want to fish deep with a sinking fly lines...use a short leader. Long leaders tend to drift back up towards the surface, keeping your offering well off the bottom.

Fishing the Small Streams of Colorado

...along with with DFC Trout Bums, Joe Staller & Dick Brooks

I've always been a fan of the "annual" fishing trip. You know what I mean—you have a good trip to Lee's Ferry, or Rocky Point, or the San Juan or elsewhere, where you have a life changing experience—and suddenly the annual trip is born. You strive every year to go to the same destination and re-create that magical experience—where you caught the most fish, or the biggest fish, or the most challenging or fun fish of your fishing career. That's how my annual August Colorado trip got started. I finally found a reliable time and location where I could catch wild trout on dry flies.

In anticipation of my 2016 trip I went through all of my fly boxes to make sure I was stocked up with my small stream favorites, which for the most part are bead head hare's ears in various colors and sizes, and big bushy dry flies—mostly size 14, 12, and even size 10 lime butted Trudes. I made sure I also had my back-up flies—parachute Adams, copper Johns, Pat's stoneflies, and some specialty flies that have proven useful over the years—red quill spinners and big green drake imitations are among them. With that task done, I checked to make sure I had fresh 9 foot 4X leaders, and fresh 4X and 5X tippet. I like nylon tippet for fishing dry flies, but I use fluorocarbon from my dry to any sunken droppers since it sinks a little better and to my mind is a little harder for a fish to spot. Finally, I gather the rest of my fishing gear, stock up my little tear drop trailer and I'm ready to go!

For the 2016 adventure, I roped Dick Brooks into being my wingman. Our first stop was southwest Colorado, where we took a day or two to fish the Dolores River below the McPhee reservoir. We did catch a few small rainbows, but the bigger browns and rainbows eluded us. Plus, the mosquitoes were truly horrifying, which helped in the decision to move to our next location—a short hop to Durango, where we fished the meadow section of the Hermosa. Both Dick and I landed numerous wild cutthroats on dry flies, while fishing just a short section of meandering meadow stream. The following day, we moved to Cascade creek, where I've had great days in past years catching numerous aggressive brook trout on big dry flies. This year it was a little tougher, in that water flows and turbidity were up, but we still managed enough brook trout to make it worthwhile.

We then moved to the Glenwood Springs area due to the abundance of fishing opportunities in the surrounding vicinity. World class fisheries like the Frying Pan, Roaring Fork and Colorado Rivers are just minutes from town. And trout that are measured in pounds, not inches, inhabit these fisheries. Truth in fact, I've had great days fishing these rivers but we spent most of our time fishing the lesser known small streams in the area. One morning, Dick and I hiked up a trail that paralleled one of these creeks, and then dropped in and waded our way upstream, dropping short casts into every likely pocket and seam. We could do no wrong! By the end of the day, both Dick and I had each landed the Colorado small stream slam—a cutthroat, a rainbow, a cut-bow, a brook trout and a brown! All on dry flies, and all on the same stretch of water.

Five secrets to fishing small streams: 1) Get away from the campground. A good rule of thumb is to hike at least 30 minutes from the last place a motorized vehicle can get to—these fish will be much less pressured than those close to the road. 2) Fish the dry/dropper system. I start out with a fairly large dry fly, and a bead head nymph 18" below my dry. If I get a lot of attention to my dry fly, I might snip off the nymph and either fish a single dry fly or add a smaller dry fly to give the fish a choice 3) Fish all of the water. Most of the time, the fish are right where they are supposed to be—behind the rocks, in the large pools, under the over-hanging cover. But sometimes the best fish are in the skinny water right by the bank, or between the holes. Why? I have no idea. Check out all the possible spots. 4) Keep moving! The number one problem I see new anglers have is the tendency to fish too long in one spot. My rule of thumb is no more than three good casts to great looking spots, and one or two casts to less likely spots. Then move upstream. 5) Be prepared! Bring lunch, a rain jacket and a water filter.

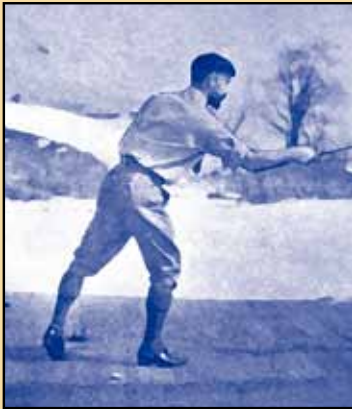
